I recently had the pleasure along with Marc Lacy of attending a Memorial Service for a sailor who was killed on December 7, 1941 while serving on the USS Oklahoma. The service was for MU2 Francis E. "Ham" Dick.



Family and friends were joined by members of the community to remember the sacrifice of this member of the Greatest Generation. Petty Officer Dick was from Woodland, WA and loved music and had a great aptitude for learning different instruments. He was remembered by his sister who was only three at the time of his death. The foyer and the chapel were decorated with musical memorabilia and mementos from his era. The Patriot Guard escorted Petty Officer Dick into the chapel and escorted him to his final resting place at the Vancouver Barracks

Post Cemetery. It was very touching that the Navy is still trying to identify the Sailors and Marines who made the ultimate sacrifice, and returning them home to their families. The date of the service was also poignant, it was on the anniversary of his mother receiving the telegram that he had perished at Pearl Harbor. 

Supporting and attending 40 et 8 Promenades, Wrecks, Conventions; Youth & Senior Programs; Memorial Dedications; Boys and Girls State; American Flags for First Graders; Special Olympics; Participations in various patriotic functions, etc.

"Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service"

Visits to the Veteran Administration Medical Center on a regular basis, giving comfort and assistance to, or just visit with, the hospitalized veterans. The 40 & 8 has adopted an additional program for these veterans called "Keep Those Wheelchairs Rolling." The special "needs" may cover a project, equipment, or comfort and convenience items needed by the hospitalized veterans.

CARVILLE STAR

"A bi-monthly publication printed and published by the patients at the National Hansen Disease Center at Carville, Louisiana"

The primary purpose of the STAR is to provide doctors around the world with the results of the ongoing research and treatment; it is also intended to promote an enlighten public awareness and opinion on Hansen's Disease. In many countries, this is the only information the doctors have concerning the treatment of the disease.

NATIONAL BOX CAR ASSOCIATION

The National Box Car Association is an independent association which raises funds for special projects at Promenade Nationale. Each year a party for special children is planned at the host city. These special children and their escorts are treated to lunch, train rides provided entertainment and by HOBO Clowns and bands. Another project at Promenade Nationale is a monetary donation to the local VAVS Hospital or Clinic. This contribution usually goes to the patient Services Area. All funds are used within the year they are raised.

CHILD WELFARE

"40 & 8's First Program"

Founded in 1923 to ease the pain and suffering of children whose fathers never came back from the war, or were unable to care for their needs. Today, our efforts touch millions of children with the investment of over seven million dollars annually.

NURSES TRAINING

"The Nurses Training Program; established to meet the ever increasing need for trained nurses."

It is more than fifty years since the 40 & 8 has been recognizing the need for trained nurses in this country. The 40 & 8 began a program that would provide scholarships to deserving individuals who were willing to undergo formal training and make a career in this very noble profession. The 40 & 8 has assisted more than 32,000 nurses in obtaining their degrees. The Nurses Training Program is primarily administered at the Voiture Locale Level.

YOUTH SPORTS

"The program encompasses all sports and is available to all youth 7 through 20 years of age, regardless of sex, race, or creed."

The primary purpose of the program is to provide monetary assistance to deserving and needy athletes or teams to participate in sporting events. This is done through grants to the individuals or teams when applied for by a Voiture Locale or Grande Voiture.

POW/MIA

"The primary purpose of this program has become the Survivor Scholarship Program."

Service personnel declared as Prisoners of War or Missing in Action have been the subject government accounting of procedures and today, every veteran's organization, in whatever fashion, takes time to recognize these missing brothers and sisters. POW/MIA Scholarship The program has limited its fund distributions to the veteran's spouse, son, daughter, grandson, granddaughter of a known and verified POW/MIA who served after December 7, 1941. These scholarships are funded through a perpetual trust.
