Merchant Marines

•WWl -629 killed in merchant ships. 128 killed on Lusitania.

• WW1 - Approximately 9,000 merchant marines killed. 1 in 26. The men of the merchant marine were Civilian volunteers who nonetheless died proportionally in numers that rivaled or exceed any branch of the uniformed military.

- 12,000wounded.
- 600 prisioners of war.

• 1,554 ships sunk (773 over 1000 gross tons).

• 142 USMMA Cadets lost tlieir lives on merchant ships during their sea year.

FDR - the men of our American Merchant Marine have pushed through despite the perils of the submarine, the dive bomber, and the surface raider. They have returned voluntarily fo their jobs at sea again and again, because they realized that the life-lines to our battle fronts would be broken if they did not carry out their vital part in this global war. In their hands, our vital supply lines are expanding. Their skill and determination will keep open the highway to victory and

Dwight David Eisenhower - General of the Army

Every man in this Allied command is quick to express his admiration for the loyalty, courage and fortitude of the officer and men of the Merchant Marine. We count upon their efficiency and their utter devotion fo duty as we do our own; they have never failed us yet and in all the struggles yet to come we know that they will never be deterred by any danger, hardship, or privation. When final victory is ours, there is no organization that will share its credit more deservedly than the Melrehant Marine.

VE Day May 8,1945 - Eisenhower - the truly heroic man of this war is GI Joe and his counterpart of the Air, Navy and Merchant Marine.



Patrick McAllister, president of the Merchant Marines Association in Portland/Vancouver presented the plaque to Morris and Frank for the 40/8.

"Up here, we work by results," says Saint Peter. "While you preached, people slept. While he drove, people prayed."




La Femmes

ARLINGTON CEMETERY

Jeopardy Question: On Jeopardy the other night, the final question was "How many steps does the guard take during his walk across the tomb of the Unknowns?"

All three contestants missed it!

This is really an awesome sight to watch if you've never had the chance. Fascinating. Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

1. How many steps does the guard take during his walk across the tomb of the Unknowns and why?

21 steps : It alludes to the twentyone gun salute which is the highest honor given any military or foreign dignitary.

2. How long does he hesitate after his about face to begin his return walk and why?

21 seconds for the same reason as answer number 1.

3. Why are his gloves wet?

His gloves are moistened to prevent his losing his grip on the rifle.

4. Does he carry his rifle on the same shoulder all the time and, if not, why not?

He carries the rifle on the shoulder away from the tomb. After his march across the path, he executes an about face and moves the rifle to the outside shoulder.

5. How often are the guards changed?

Guards are changed every thirty minutes, twenty-four hours a day,

365 days a year.

6. What are the physical traits of the guard limited to?

For a person to apply for guard duty at the tomb, he must be between 5' 10' and 6' 2' tall and his waist size cannot exceed 30. They must commit 2 years of life to guard the tomb, live in a barracks under the tomb, and cannot drink any alcohol on or off duty for the rest of their lives. They cannot swear in public for the rest of their lives and cannot disgrace the uniform or the tomb in any way.

After two years, the guard is given a wreath pin that is worn on their lapel signifying theyserved as guard of the tomb. There are only 400 presently worn. The guard must obey these rules for the rest of their lives or give up the wreath pin.

The shoes are specially made with very thick soles to keep the heat and cold from their feet. There are metal heel plates that extend to the top of the shoe in order to make the loud click as they come to a halt.

There are no wrinkles, folds or lint on the uniform. Guards dress for duty in front of a full-length mirror.

The first six months of duty a guard cannot talk to anyone nor watch TV.

All off duty time is spent studying the 175 notable people laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery. A guard must memorize who they are and where they are interred. Among the notables are: President Taft, Joe Lewis {the boxer}, Medal of Honor winner Audie L. Murphy, the most decorated soldier of WWII and of Hollywood fame.

Every guard spends five hours a day getting his uniforms ready for guard duty..

ETERNAL REST GRANT THEM O LORD AND LET PERPETUAL LIGHT SHINE UPON THEM.

In 2003 as Hurricane Isabelle was approaching Washington, DC, our US Senate/House took 2 days off with anticipation of the storm. On the ABC evening news, it was reported that because of the dangers from the hurricane, the military members assigned the duty of guarding the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier were given permission to suspend the assignment.

They respectfully declined the offer, "No way, Sir!" Soaked to the skin, marching in the pelting rain of a tropical storm, they said that guarding the Tomb was not just an assignment, it was the highest honor that can be afforded to a service person. The tomb has been patrolled continuously, 24/7, since 1930.

God Bless and keep them.

We can be very proud of our men and women in the service no matter where they serve.
