



WHAT IS THE TRUE MEANING OF EASTER?

If you ask your young child or grandchildren, I'm sure they would answer that is when the Easter bunny brings baskets filled with colored eggs, jelly-beans and chocolate bunnies etc. and it there is so much more concerning this spring holiday.

Easter is the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus from the tomb on the third day after his crucifixion. Easter is the fulfilled prophecy of the Messiah who would be persecuted, die for our sins, and rise on the third day (Isaiah

53). Remembering the resurrection of Jesus is a way to renew daily hope that we have victory over sin. According to the New Testament, Easter is three days after the death of Jesus on the cross.

Easter follows a period of fasting called Lent, in which many churches set aside time for repentance and remembrance. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Good Friday, the day of Jesus' crucifixion. The 40-day period was established by Pope Gregory 1 using the 40-day pattern of Israel, Moses, Elijah and Iesus' time in the wilderness

The week leading up to Easter is called The Holy Week, or "Passion Week", and includes Palm Sunday (the day Jesus entered Jerusalem and was celebrated), Maundy Thursday (the "Last Supper" where Jesus met with his disciples to observe Passover), and Good Friday (when Jesus would be crucified on the cross).

Easter is a very significant date within Christianity and is the foundation of the Christian faith. Jesus, the Son of God, fulfilled prophecy and through his death, has given the gift of eternal life in heaven to those who believe in his death and resurrection. Read the entire Biblical account of Resurrection Day in Matthew 28, Mark 16, and Luke 24.

Shortly, another holiday that will be coming up in May and I'm sure you know what I'm referring to and that's the day we take hopefully the entire day to show our respect to those that have paid the ultimate sacrifice to the Country they so loved.

Of course, I'm now referring to Memorial Day. I have been blessed over the years serving La Société including this year as your Aumônier National. I remind all to remember to conduct your Annual Calvin Kane Ceremony during your Promenade or other fitting time during the month of May as close to Memorial Day as possible, in Memory of those Voyageurs that had reported to Voiture Everlasting during the year. And, remember to report it on your Annual Ritual Report.

In closing, let us pray; Lord, we lift our hearts to you. As the dawn breaks, may we carry the unity we share into eve moment knowing that we are one with the risen Christ. Lord we lift our eyes to you. As the sun rises, may this moment stay with us, reminding us to look for the beautiful colors of promise in your word. Lord, we lift our prayers to you. As the dew air falls, may we breathe this morning in and know that like the earth, you sustain us, keep us and work within us always.

To paraphrase the great Alan Jackson, we have some time to look back at the things we've done and recognize that they are just steppin' stones that got us where we've been and where we are now, and we can do it all again when the enemy is defeated.

At our Carville Star Committee meeting during the Cajun Wreck, we reviewed recent Program accomplishments. Res-

toration of the Daughters of Charity Cemetery plot was a huge success thanks to financial generosity of many voyageurs and dames. The interpretive signs that

pretive signs that we funded now guide Carville visitors to more points of interest throughout the Carville Historic District. Moving forward, not even the invisible enemy was able to stop the recent completion of our first 2020 project. We funded the reconstruction of a capital that stood atop one of the columns of the Indian Plantation House in the 1850's. (A "capital" is a decora-

tive piece found at the top of column.) The Indian Plantation House became the Carville hospital after the first Daughters of Charity showed up in 1894 to care for Hansen's Disease (HD) patients. Recently discovered in storage at a Carville warehouse, one damaged capital and pieces of others were reconstructed to make a complete capital. Soon to become the centerpiece of an exhibit about the earliest

days at Carville, the capital will be the oldest artifact on display in the museum.

The Carville Star

Program has been a steppin' stone for the Forty and Eight. In 1943, the era of 40&8 at Carville began with the donation of a printing press. The printing press supported the mass distribution of The Star. a publication dedicated to HD patient advocacy and ultimately responsible for a sequence of events that improved the plight of HD patients. (The Star helped dispel the notion of extreme "sheltering in place" imposed upon patients at Carville.) Thanks to our 40&8 funding, publication and distribution of The Star continues today, still with a mission to educate and reduce stigma about a disease state that has plagued mankind for

centuries.

The Carville Star Program, Child Welfare, Nurses Training, Youth Sports, Americanism, POW/ MIA, Box Car, and VAVS are all steppin' stones that got us where we are today. Through service to veterans and citizens of our communities, our 40&8 programs define who we are now and how

Fourteen volunteers drove a total of 3,418 miles, expended 319 man hours and distributed 2,186 flags to fist graders and teachers. The presentation consists of a short history of our Flag, the meaning of the Pledge of Allegiance, the history of when and who wrote the National Anthem and we demonstrate how to correctly fold the Flag along with the meaning of each fold. A poem "For The Love of My Old Glory" is read at the end of the presentation, the teachers are given a condensed copy of the presentation and the students are given a letter to take home to their parents explaining why they have a small flag and our presentation. Certificates are presented to the fourteen volunteers at the end of the school visits expressing appreciation for their support as illustrated in the picture of Presidente Nationale 2020 Penny Haigler receiving her certificate of appreciation.


an opportunity to do some telephone recruiting for our organization.

were on hand to witness the long-awaited renaming ceremony of the Billings clinics for World War II Veterans Dr. Joseph Medicine Crow, the last member of the Crow Tribe to become a war chief, and Benjamin Steele.

There are days when many of us may feel an increased sense of anxiety and stress. This can be a normal response when our routines are disrupted and information changes from day to day. This can also create a sense of fear. Many times, it is the anticipation of what may or may not happen that can contribute to this stress as well.

Today's #Veteran Of The Day is Air Force Veteran Emma Breitbarth, who served in the 500th Bomb Wing and now helps Veterans with career advising. Emma J. Breitbarth served in the Air Force from 1985 to 1989.

We honor your service, Emma!

The Internal Revenue Service today issued a special alert for Supplemental Security Income and Department of Veterans Affairs beneficiaries to act by May 5 if they didn't file a tax return in 2018 or 2019 and have dependents so they can quickly receive the full amount of their Economic Impact Payment. Their \$1,200 payments will be issued soon and, in order to add the \$500 per eligible child amount to these payments, the IRS needs the dependent information before the

payments are issued.
