They saw fit to carve out this unique Veterans Organization called and should encourage a more proficient use of our Ritual. It might be well for this committee to conduct meetings. By using our Ritual, we follow the plan our WWl founders laid out for us. At the Promenade Natio-Manual of Ceremonies book you will find our Ritual, in-

nale Ritual Committee meet-ing this past fall, it was decided to use the same password for another year. Also in the third degree of a wreck, the "Spirit of Sgt Younger" is not optional anymore it is mandatory. On page 37 of the large print book and page 31 of the small print book please black out the "Optional" sentence just above "The Spirit of Sgt Vouroer" Younger".

Grande de Wisconsin has had a long tradition of competing

for the Nationale Color Guard Honors. Any Voiture Locale or Grande Voiture Color Guard may compete for this national honor. This is the time of year to begin form-ing a Color Guard and practicing for the fall competition at Myrtle Beach. The Blue Ritual & Manual of Ceremonies states : "There is a great need for Memorial Ceremonies for our deceased Comrades. This work would be carried out by (Grandes) Voitures Locale in those counties (states) where organized. Each Voiture of La Societe shall, at least once each year, carry to comple-tion a Memorial Ceremony in respectful memory of those veterans who have passed to the great beyond during the preceding year. It is recom-mended that this service be opened promptly at 11:00 A.M. on any morning during the year as may be selected by the Voiture concerned. Memorial Day or Veterans Day are naturally the best days on which to hold the ceremony but, it is realized that parades and other ceremonies often interfere. Therefore, the

day to be scheduled is left to the discretion of the Voiture concerned."

There are five different Memorial Services listed, each for a different purpose. Since 1940 when the Calvin Kain Memorial Service was official-ly adopted by Voiture Nationale, Langlade County Voiture 1204 has been conducting this short but meaningful memorial service the evening before Memorial Day. The families of our deceased Voyageurs are invited to attend along with attending Voyageurs' fami-lies. This adds to the solemni-ty of the service. All Voiture Locales should conduct this short service of remembrance to honor their departed fellow Voyageurs.

The 99th Birthday of the 40 et 8 is March 15, 2019. Our Ritual & Manual of Ceremo-nies has "Ritual of Celebration for the Birthday" on page 72 in the large print edition. This celebration is a great recruiting tool which is open to the public. You are encouraged to use it and begin a new tradition for your Voiture.

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THE MERCI TRAIN, A FORGOTTEN LEGACY

Part of US History finds a new home in downtown Bishopville

"Imagine, if you will, a day long ago, in another country even, when the world was a different place. It is 1918 and Lee County had only been formed 16 years earlier from parts of Darlington, Kershaw and Sumter Counties. Computers had not yet been invented, no one had landed on the moon, it took three and a half months to travel from London to Australia. The average car cost \$400, the average US wage was 22 cents an hour, only 8 percent of folks had a land line telephone, and cell phones weren't even a twinkle in someone's eye.

Only 6 percent of the US population had graduated from high school, a loaf of bread costs 7 cents, Woodrow Wilson was President and the US was at War with Germany. Somewhere in France, young men from South Carolina were traveling in a roughriding 40 and 8, a boxcar that was carrying them to the front to fight the Germans.

South Carolinians were split on whether or not the US should be involved in WWI, but 300,000 both blacks and whites, signed up for the draft and 52,000 were drafted.

The Medal of Honor was awarded to only 78 Americans for their service in World War I and 8 of these went to South Carolinians. 6 went to members of the National Guard's 18th Regiment......

These men were some of the first South Carolinians to ride in the boxcars known as the 40 and 8 that were used to transport troops to the front.

Just a short 20 years later, the boxcars would be called into service again for the troop deployment in WWII and again soldiers from South Carolina, some who would never return, were packed in and sent to the front.

On a recent Saturday, that relic from almost a century ago, a reminder of both the horror and the bravery and sacrifice of the South Carolinians who fought in those two World Wars, arrived in Bishopville."

*this was an excerpt from an Article done by Lillian Turner that appeared in the Lee County Observer Newspaper in Bishopville, South Carolina in September 2017.

This was published right after the South Carolina Merci Boxcar was moved from Columbia, SC to Bishopville, SC. The Boxcar was located at an American Legion Post in Columbia, SC, however, when the Voiture Locale that was looking after it merged and moved with another Voiture Locale, it needed a new home. The Military Museum and the Cotton Museum in Bishopville expressed interest and ended up moving it to a location on Main street in the center of town. They have done a tremendous job of presenting the Boxcar to the public and restoring it to its former condition.

On November 11th, at 11 am, all the town bells chimed 11 times and that was the start of a wonderful dedication ceremony with Voyageurs and Dames from Grande du South Carolina along with local residents in attendance. My favorite part was that a local artisan crafted a Medal of Valor for the entrance gate.

"One of the soldiers who did return from WWII is 91 year old Bob Walden, a retired banker and lifelong resident of Lee County. Saturday two weeks ago, on Bishopville's Main Street, he walks over and introduces himself and says, "I was in France, Germany and the European theatre in 1945. Some time in the first half 1945 I rode on those boxcars on two different occasions. You just sat down on the floor or stood up – that was all there was to it. We went from France over to Germany and it took a whole day as I remember it. We came back to the US and were supposed to go to the Pacific theatre, but they dropped the Atomic Bomb so we didn't have to go. That was in July of '45."

Walden gazes across the muddy lot at the boxcar on the flatbed and nods his head slowly, "it's exactly like I remember it. Size. Color. It's really in wonderful shape. I'm sure every WWII veteran who rode in one, they'll come look at this thing eventually."

"If they're still living," he adds, "I'm 91 and I'm one of the youngest and there's probably not many after me still living."

Riding in the boxcar did not make for a comfortable journey. The cars were built to hold 40 men and 8 horses; however, it would seem that the French men and horses were smaller than the American versions and even just carrying 30 US Soldiers made for a tight fit. Even though the boxcars were slow, and stink in the warmer months, the Doughboys and GI's spent so much time being shuttled about in them that they became a predictable part of the soldiers' war time experience.

Officers in charge of the boxcar and more experienced travelers scrambled into the cars as quickly as possible to claim the best spots – a corner where you could wedge your pack for a pillow. Once the car was loaded, the waiting began.

It could be hours before the train started.

Often the smell of horse manure hung heavy in the cars, mingling with the dust and sweat of the men. In hot weather, prime spots were by the door or near a crack where a soldier could get a breath of fresh air. These same spots became drafty and freezing in the winter. There were hard benches that ran the length of the car, but sleeping was done standing or lying head to foot in two tight lines. Soldiers had only their coats and a blanket for warmth. Fleas, a gift left behind from the horses, were ever present companions.

The travelers were rocked, rattled and shaken as the cars rumbled through the countryside. Candles or lanterns were sometimes smuggled aboard, and soldiers read or played cards. Many smoked pipes and cigarettes to help keep warm. A 15-hour journey could often take 60 hours once stops and breakdowns were factored in. The trains moved slowly, that soldiers could often get off and run from car to car while the train was on route to its destination.

Despite all this, soldiers often looked upon the train cars with something close to affection. Although the boxcars would be carrying some men to their deaths, they would carry others away from the fighting. They would also provide a much-needed sense of regularity and familiarity in a time when life was unpredictable and often shadowed by fear and horror.

And on a recent October Saturday, that relic from almost a century ago, a reminder of both the horror of war and the bravery and sacrifice of the South Carolinians who fought in those two World Wars, arrived in Bishopville. These small boxcars, once a key component of the Allied War Machine, were transformed into 49 gift boxes to show the French's appreciation of the US's support during war time and after. Ronnie Williams, Com-

mander of the VFW Post 3096 of Bishopville and a director of the Lee County Veterans Museum, spearheaded the drive to bring the boxcar to Bishopville. He said, "I saw the article about the boxcar in Columbia, and I'd never heard of it and did some research. It's a tremendous thing. Most of the Veterans from WWI and WWII are gone. This is one of the last vestiges, a remote tie to that time. And if we let it slip away without sharing it, it will be gone. We owe it to the veterans and the civilians to keep this history alive." He points out that at the Veterans Museum, "We're in the business of preserving history, especially military history. This is an amazing piece of history, a one of a kind relic. There's only 39 left and this is one of them. It's gotta be good for Bishopville."

The Executive Director of the Lee County Chamber of Commerce said "fit is such a privilege to be part of this town and to witness its ability to persevere. The Merci Train is just one more reason to be proud of Bishopville and its Veterans. I hope that its arrival will be a lesson to the younger generation that we need to preserve history and appreciate our men and women who have fought for our Country."

The last paragraph of the article summed up perfectly the importance of preserving the Merci Boxcars, which I encourage EVERY Grande and Voyageur in La Societe to do...

"Korean War Veteran, Gilbert Baker, stopped by to watch the unloading of the boxcar. He stood for a while in the drizzle and then turned to me and said, "You'd never have to look for another story to write about for the paper if that boxcar could talk." Ain't that the truth."

IT WILL BE 70 YEARS IN FEBRUARY OF 2019

In 1947, a Friendship Train carried s40 million in relief supplies to France and Italy. The 700-car train was the brainchild of Drew Pearson, an American newspaper columnist. As the little train moved across the country, its popularity and notoriety skyrocketed. By the time it reached New York, it was actually three trains coming in from all different directions. Once in New York, the food was unloaded and sent by ship -- with ample notice where it was coming from -- to France and Italy.

A French veteran and

Picard started a movement to send surplus WWI era boxcars to the US filled with tokens of appreciation from the people of France to the people of America. In all, 49 boxcars would be sent -- each packed with mementos from French citizens of every age and class.

Each state would receive a boxcar. One would be split between Washington, DC and the territory of Hawaii. The boxcars were of an especially appropriate type -- known as the 40 et 8 -- 'suitable' for 40 men or 8 horses. These small boxcars had transported thousands of American GIs during the wars; each cramped, bumpy ride leaving a lasting impression on the passengers. Each boxcar was decorated with a painted 'Gratitude Train' ribbon and with 40 coat-of-arms representing the provinces of France.

The French boxcars arrived in New York Harbor aboard the ship Magellan in February 1949.

The ship was met by waves of aircraft and a flotilla of boats. With 'Merci, America' painted across its hull, it was docked and unloaded. New York's boxcar was paraded through Manhattan. The other boxcars were loaded onto flatcars (their wide wheel axles not compatible with our track width) and sent off to the far reaches of the nation.

Each state had a reception waiting for their boxcar. Several states sent their boxcars on tours of the state so everyone could see the car and its contents. They came to rest permanently in municipal parks, railroad museums, fairgrounds, and Veterans Posts. Most survive to this day. My suggestion is this: Go to http://www.mercitrain. org/ and find if your state still has its train and where it is located. Plan a statewide visit to the train in February to honor the WWI & WWII veterans that prompted the events leading up to the Friendship and Merci trains. Invite all voyagers from across the state. Take pictures and send them to voiturenational@msn.com our Forty & Eighter official publication. Send pictures and a story to your local newspaper or even better contact them to show up at your celebration. FORTY & EIGHTER
