Central States Cornhole Tournament



Grande du Oklahoma hosted six states during the annual Central States Promenade April 28-30, 2022, in Oklahoma City. 68 Representatives from six of the seven states attended, including Iowa, Texas, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Oklahoma. Only Colorado was absent from the weekend

The La Femmes from 1540 assisted the Grande with ideas for activities, and the most successful one of all was a single elimination cornhole tournament Saturday evening April 29th. Surprisingly, 52 of the 68 attendees signed up for the tournament during registration, and as a "get to know you" rule, each team was created by drawing the names of the 52 players from a hat – ensuring most of the 26 teams would consist of players that didn't know their teammates. "That idea was amazing" said Voiture 1540 Chef Bill Hart. "By the end of the tournament and weekend, new friendships were created over a simple game of tossing corn bags."

Nearly three hours and 25 games later, the champions were crowned. Nick Weyers (Grand du Kansas) and Chip Berkley (Grand du Missouri) defeated Pam Benton (Grande Cabane de Oklahoma) and Marshall Edwards (Grande du Texas), with Oklahoma's Master of Games Judy Peltzer handing out first and second place awards.

Tax-Exempt Status for Veterans Organizations under IRC 501(c)(19)?

A post or organization of past or present members of the Armed Forces of the United States must file Form 1024 to apply for recognition of exemption from federal income tax. The organization must also meet the qualifications described below.

Examples of groups that qualify for exemption are posts or auxiliaries of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and similar organizations.

To qualify for recognition of exemption, your application should show:

- 1.) That the post or organization is organized in the United States or any of its possessions,
- 2.) That at least 75% of the members are past or present members of the U.S. Armed Forces and that at least 97.5% of all members of the organization are past or present members of the U.S. Armed Forces, cadets (including only students in college or university ROTC programs or at armed services academies) or spouses, widows, widowers, ancestors, or lineal descendants of any of those listed here, and
- 3.) That no part of net earnings inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual.

In addition to these requirements, a veterans' organization also must be operated exclusively for one or more of the following purposes.

- 1.) To promote the social welfare of the community (that is, to promote in some way the common good and general welfare of the people of the community).
- 2.) To assist disabled and needy war veterans and members of the U.S. Armed Forces and their dependents and the widows and orphans of deceased veterans.
- 3.) To provide entertainment, care, and assistance to hospitalized veterans or members of the U.S. Armed Forces.
- 4.) To carry on programs to perpetuate the memory of deceased veterans and members of the Armed Forces and to comfort their survivors.
- 5.) To conduct programs for religious, charitable, scientific, literary, or educational purposes.
- 6.) To sponsor or participate in activities of a patriotic nature.
- 7.) To provide insurance benefits for its members or dependents of its members or both.
- 8.) To provide social and recreational activities for its members.

Auxiliary unit.

An auxiliary unit or society of a veterans' organization can apply for recognition of exemption provided that the veterans' organization (parent organization) meets the requirements explained earlier in this section. The auxiliary unit or society must also meet all the following additional requirements.

- 1.) It is affiliated with, and organized in accordance with, the bylaws and regulations formulated by the parent organization.
- 2.) At least 75% of its members are either past or present members of the U.S. Armed Forces, spouses of those members, or related to those members within two degrees of kinship (grandparent, brother, sister, and grandchild represent the most distant allowable relationship).
- 3.) All of its members either are members of the parent organization, spouses of a member of the parent organization, or related to a member of such organization within two degrees of kinship.
- 4.) No part of its net earnings inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual.

Vice Presidential History

Nelson Aldrich Rockefeller (July 8, 1908 - January 26, 1979), sometimes referred to by his nickname Rocky, was an American businessman and politician who served as the 41st vice president of the United States from December 1974 to January 1977, and previously as the 49th governor of New York from 1959 to 1973. He also served as assistant secretary of State for American Republic Affairs for Presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S. Truman (1944-1945) as well as under secretary of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) under Dwight D. Eisenhower from 1953 to 1954. In 1980, HEW split into 2 cabinet level agencies: Health & Human Services (HHS) & Department of Education. A grandson of Standard Oil founder John D. Rockefeller and a member of the wealthy Rockefeller family, he was a noted art collector and served as administrator of Rockefeller Center in Manhattan, New York City.

Rockefeller was a Republican who was often considered to be liberal, progressive, or moderate. In an agreement that was termed the Treaty of Fifth Avenue, Rockefeller persuaded Richard Nixon to alter the Republican Party platform just before the 1960 Republican Conven-



tion. In his time, liberals in the Republican Party were called "Rockefeller Republicans". As Governor of New York from 1959 to 1973, Rockefeller's achievements included the expansion of the State University of New York, efforts to protect the environment, the construction of the Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller Empire State Plaza in Albany, increased facilities and personnel for medical care, and the creation

of the New York State Council on the Arts.

After unsuccessfully seeking the Republican presidential nomination in 1960, 1964, and 1968, Rockefeller was appointed vice president of the United States under President Gerald Ford, who ascended to the presidency following the August 1974 resignation of Richard Nixon. Rockefeller was the second vice president appointed to the position under the 25th Amendment, following Ford himself. Rockefeller declined to be placed on the 1976 Republican ticket with Ford. He retired from politics in 1977 and died two years later.

As a businessman, Rockefeller was president and later chair of Rockefeller Center, Inc., and he formed the International Basic Economy Corporation in 1947. Rockefeller assembled a significant art collection and promoted public access to the arts. He served as trustee, treasurer, and president of the Museum of Modern Art, and founded the Museum of Primitive Art in 1954. In the area of philanthropy, he founded the Rockefeller Brothers Fund in 1940 with his four brothers and established the American International Association for Economic and Social Development in 1946.
