RED FLAGS TO WATCH FOR TO AVOID SCAMS

- You are asked to pay out of pocket to receive the test or vaccine.
- You are asked to pay for your name to be placed on a waiting list or to jump ahead in line to receive the test or vaccine.
- You receive unsolicited advertisements for tests or vaccines online or through social media, email, or telephone calls, or from unknown sources.
- You are contacted in person or by phone or email to tell you the government or government officials require you to receive a COVID-19 vaccine.
- You receive offers to buy vaccines from unauthorized vendors.
- You see Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) that appears fake in the VA supply chain.

SEE SOMETHING. SAY SOMETHING.

If you believe you have been the victim of a COVID-19 scam, report it.

Keep a record of all medical bills and report any errors or suspicious claims immediately to VA or your Third-Party Administrator (TPA)

"Happy St. Patrick's Day to You!" -John C. Murphy - Aumonier National

"Lá fhéile Pádraig sona dhuit!"

It is just two days away before everyone turns Green and is Irish for the Day it seems. My question is, but do you know why?

St. Patrick's Day occurs annually on March 17 and honors a 5th century Christian missionary to the pagans of Ireland. It is celebrated in Roman Catholicism and other Christian denominations that honor saints but is especially popular as a secular festival celebrating all things Irish.

Saint Patrick was an English (or perhaps Scottish) missionary to Ireland. Scholars agree that he is a historical figure and that he converted many of the pagans on the island to Christianity.

While St. Patrick's Day is now associated with wearing green, parades (when they are not canceled) and beer, the holiday is grounded in history that dates back more than 1,500 years. The earliest known celebration was held on March 17, 1631, marking the anniversary of the death of St. Patrick in the 5th century.

The feast day of Saint Patrick has been observed in Ireland on March 17 for hundreds of years. The date falls during the fasting season of Lent, but on Saint Patrick's Day the prohibitions against eating meat were lifted, and the Irish would celebrate their patron saint with dancing, drinking, and feasting on the traditional meal of Irish bacon and cabbage.

According to Christian legend, St. Patrick used the three-leafed clover to illustrate the doctrine of the Trinity to his pagan audience in Ireland. However, this story did not appear until more than 1000 years after St. Patrick's death. In ancient Ireland, the Celtic people revered the shamrock as a sacred plant because it symbolized the rebirth of spring. By the 17th century, when the English began to seize Irish land and suppress Irish language and religion, the shamrock became a symbol of Irish nationalism. The shamrock gained its widespread identity among the people of Ireland around the 5th century during the introduction and establishment of Christianity in Ireland by St. Patrick. According to Irish tales, Saint Patrick demonstrated the foundation of Christian faith and trinity using the three leaves of the shamrock. He portrayed them to

represent Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.

According to legend the Christian missionary chased all the snakes into the sea with a powerful sermon after they attacked him during a 40-day fast he was taking part in on top of a hill. However, it looks like St Patrick may have been credited with something he did not actually do

The diminutive creatures we know as leprechauns were known in ancient Irish as lobaircin, meaning "small-bodied fellow." Belief in leprechauns probably stems from Celtic belief in fairies, tiny creatures who could use their magical powers for good or evil. In Celtic folklore, the lobaircin were cranky fairies who mended the shoes of the other fairies. They were also mischievous and delighted in trickery, which they used to guard their fabled treasure.

Corned beef and cabbage are the traditional meal enjoyed by many on St. Patrick's Day, but only half of it is truly Irish. Cabbage has long been a staple of the Irish diet, but it was traditionally served with Irish bacon, not corned beef. St. Patrick's Day is celebrated worldwide by the Irish, those of Irish descent, and everyone else who enjoys being "Irish for a day.

The most common traditions on St. Patrick's Day include wearing green, enjoying Irish folk music and food, and by consuming large quantities of Irish beer (sometimes dyed green), such as Murphys, Smithwicks, Harp or Guinness or other Irish liquors such as Irish whiskey, Irish Coffee or Baileys Irish Cream.

In the United States, St. Patrick's Day would not be St. Patrick's Day unless the Chicago River is dyed green. This tradition began in 1962, when Chicago pollution-control workers used green dye to trace illegal sewage discharges in the river. The workers thought it might be a fun way to celebrate St. Patrick's Day, so they released 100 pounds of green vegetable dye into the river – enough to keep it green for a week! The idea was a hit and continues to this day. However, only 40 pounds of dye are used today to minimize environmental damage.

"For the Lord God is a sun and shield; the Lord bestows favor and honor; no good thing does He withhold from those who walk uprightly." Ps. 84:11

In 433 A.D., history tells us that St.

Patrick was praying for God's divine protection in his work and ministry in Ireland facing while powerful enemies. He wrote this prayer called St. Patrick's Breastplate, which is still widely



known and recited today.

God soon opened the door for him to share Christ with the Irish King Laoghaire and his subjects and allowed him to be a part of bringing them out paganism's dark hold to the saving power of Jesus Christ. St. Patrick was a man who knew much about darkness, hardship, and enemy territory. He had spent years in slavery after being kidnapped by pirates at age 16. And it was in those years that he later tells how he learned about the Mighty power of God's Presence and prayer.

The life of St. Patrick is such an example to us still today, that even in the darkest of times, God's Sovereignty shines over His people. He cannot help but to come to our aid. He cannot help but to bless us and let His favor surround our lives. Because He is a good and loving God. And nothing escapes His notice. He watches overall, and we can trust that our lives and circumstances are held securely in His hands.

Dear Veterans,

English writer and philosopher Aldous Huxley once said, "There are things known and there are things unknown, and in between are the doors of perception." This statement is a perfect depiction of the hesitancy individuals may feel about receiving the COVID-19 Vaccine.

This hesitancy is understandable. There is a lot of information (and misinformation) which makes it difficult in determining if getting vaccinated is the right choice for you. Let the following facts help you gain a better understanding of the currently FDA authorized COVID-19 Vaccines.

- No vaccine (actually, nothing in medicine) is 100% safe. All vaccines including those that protect against COVID -19 have gone through careful testing and have met rigorous standards set forth by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) before being released to the public.
- Individuals perceive the development and timeline for emergency use authorization (EUA) of the COVID-19 Vaccine as "rushed." Medical experts have been studying messenger RNA (mRNA) for decades using similar viruses to COVID-19 like SARS and MERS. The mRNA technology was actually developed in the 1990s to be prepared for a significant outbreak of a virus. This is just the first time mRNA vaccine has been broadly tested and used in clinical practice. It makes sense. Why start from scratch or recreate the wheel when there is previous research that can help to protect us from COVID-19?
- COVID-19 Vaccines have been proven to be safe, effective, and are one of the

keys to fighting this pandemic. Getting vaccinated is an easy step you can take to help keep your family and those most vulnerable safe. Although we may never go back to our "pre-pandemic normal," we can only manage the pandemic if enough people get vaccinated. As vaccines roll out, we must still participate in recommended precautions (wearing a mask, practicing good hand hygiene, avoiding crowds, etc.) to significantly reduce the spread of the virus.

Severe allergic reaction to the COVID-19 Vaccine is extremely rare with reported incidence of less than 5 per million. After vaccination, individuals are required to be monitored for any reaction. Medical staff stand by and are ready to offer treatment if needed. Individuals may experience some side effects, which is a normal sign that your body is building protection. These side effects may include having flu like symptoms or may even affect a person's ability to do daily activities. Before assuming the worst, discuss the vaccine with your doctor, who can access your risk and provide additional information on how to get vaccinated safely.

I decided to get vaccinated because I did not want to get COVID-19 nor spread it to others such as my family, coworkers and friends. I received my 1st vaccination between the holidays and felt that this was the "best gift ever"!

We are fortunate to have easy access to the vaccination. This is not always the case for non-health care workers. My parents, for example, are not able to get the COVID-19 vaccinate yet. Fortunately, they are scheduled to receive it in March



even though they are of advanced age. Because of COVID-19, I have not seen my parents in over a year and am looking forward to reuniting with them as soon as both of them are fully vaccinated as well!

Before saying no to the COVID-19 vaccination or taking the "wait and see" approach, I encourage you to get informed and discuss your options with your healthcare provider.

Free Electronic Filing Options for Military Members and their Families

Active duty military personnel have multiple options for free federal tax preparation. One is <u>IRS Free File</u>. This program offers online tax preparation, electronic filing and direct deposit of refunds, at no cost.

Members of military and their families who have income below \$72,000 may choose from any of the Free File tax software companies to help them prepare their tax returns online.

Free File Fillable Forms is available for those who have income above \$72,000. Taxpayers who choose Free File Fillable Forms as their Free File option should be comfortable completing their own tax forms without the help of tax preparation software.

Taxpayers can use Free File on any personal computer, tablet or smartphone. Here's how it works:

- The taxpayer goes to the <u>Free File</u> <u>page</u> on IRS.gov to see all Free File options. Some products are available in Spanish.
- Military personnel who meet the income requirement can select from any of the providers that have "Free for Active Military for Adjusted Gross Income of \$72,000 or less in their offer.
- The taxpayer selects a provider and follows the links to their web page to

complete and electronically file their tax return.

Electronic filing, including Free File is the best way to avoid pandemic-related paper delays. E-filing combined with <u>direct deposit</u> is the fastest way to get a refund.

Using Free File can help taxpayers figuring things like their <u>earned income</u> tax credit, child and dependent care credit and recovery rebate credit. If someone is eligible for a <u>recovery rebate credit</u> – and either didn't receive Economic Impact Payments or received less than the full amounts – they must file a 2020 tax return to claim the credit even if they don't usually file.

Taxpayers using Free File will need their prior-year adjusted gross income. This is required for all electronic tax returns as part of the user's electronic signature. For taxpayers who have filed before, their 2019 tax return will show their adjusted gross income. If their 2019 return has not yet been processed, they may enter zero as their prior-year adjusted gross income. People who used the Non-Filers: Enter Payment Info Here tool last year to register for an Economic Impact Payment, should enter \$1 as their prior year AGI. People can visit IRS.gov for details on, claiming the recovery rebate credit if they aren't required to file a tax

return.

Miltax is another free tax resource available for the military community, offered through the Department of Defense. MilTax is a suite of tax services available for members of the military, as well as qualifying veterans and family members. There are no income limits. MilTax includes tax preparation and electronic filing software, personalized support from tax consultants and current information about filing taxes. It's designed to address the realities of military life - including deployments, combat and training pay, housing and rentals and multi-state filings. Eligible taxpayers can use MilTax to electronically file a federal tax return and up to three state returns for free.

Active duty military stationed in <u>combat zones</u> have more time to file their tax returns. However, those with spouses and families may choose to file as soon as they can to claim various tax benefits for which they may be eligible. If only one spouse is present to file a joint return, they must have proper authorization to file a joint tax return on behalf of their spouse The IRS website has more <u>tax information for members</u> of the military.



Vice Presidential History

Calvin Coolidge (born John Calvin Coolidge Jr.; July 4, 1872 – January 5, 1933) was an American politician and lawyer who served as the 30th president of the United States from 1923 to 1929. A Republican lawyer from New England, born in Vermont, Coolidge worked his way up the ladder of Massachusetts state politics, eventually becoming governor of Massachusetts. His response to the Boston Police Strike of 1919 thrust him into the national spotlight and gave him a reputation as a man of decisive action. The next year, he was elected the 29th vice president of the United States, and he succeeded to the presidency upon the sudden death of Warren G. Harding in 1923. Elected in his own right in 1924, he gained a reputation as a smallgovernment conservative and also as a man who said very little and had a rather dry sense of humor.

Coolidge restored public confidence in the White House after the scandals of his predecessor's administration, and left office with considerable popularity. As a Coolidge biographer wrote: "He embodied the spirit and hopes of the middle class, could interpret their longings and express their opinions. That he did represent the genius of the average is the most



convincing proof of his strength."

Scholars have ranked Coolidge in the lower half of those presidents that they have assessed. He is praised by advocates of smaller government and laissezfaire economics, while supporters of an active central government generally view him less favorably, although most praise his stalwart support of racial equality. On June 2, 1924, Coolidge signed the act granting citizenship to all Native Ameri-

cans born in the United States. By that time, two-thirds of the people were already citizens, having gained it through marriage, military service (veterans of World War I were granted citizenship in 1919), or the land allotments that had earlier taken place.

Coolidge was neither well versed in nor very interested in world affairs. His focus was directed mainly at American business, especially pertaining to trade, and "Maintaining the Status Quo." Although not an isolationist, he was reluctant to enter into foreign alliances. While Coolidge believed strongly in a noninterventionist foreign policy, he did believe that America was exceptional.

Coolidge died suddenly from coronary thrombosis at "The Beeches," at 12:45 p.m., January 5, 1933. Shortly before his death, Coolidge confided to an old friend: "I feel I no longer fit in with these times." Coolidge is buried in Plymouth Notch Cemetery, Plymouth Notch, Vermont. The nearby family home is maintained as one of the original buildings on the Calvin Coolidge Homestead District site. The State of Vermont dedicated a new visitors' center nearby to mark Coolidge's 100th birthday on July 4, 1972.
